Creative Koori (17) \$664,059

1. 2 Rivers Pty Ltd, Allambee - to remain a while. (\$56,470)

Allambee will be a celebration and revival of Aboriginal culture through a series of 10 creative workshops and exhibitions in 2 Rivers' newly created space for Aboriginal artists. The project will foster cultural creative development, expression and sharing of knowledge allowing for increased skills and creative pathways.

2. Aboriginal Regional Arts Alliance (NSW) Aboriginal Corporation, *Here, Now and Always* (\$60,000)

Here, Now and Always will establish a virtual NSW Regional Aboriginal Art Platform/Market accessible globally, creating opportunities for regional Aboriginal artists, giving worldwide exposure to advance their careers and bring people into their world to connect, learn and sell works.

3. Arwarbukarl Cultural Resource Association Inc, Awabakal Traditional Seasonal Calendar: Design, Launch and Teach (\$58,500)

The development and launch of a digitally interactive Awabakal Traditional Seasonal Calendar (diagram of changes in nature on Country during the different seasons) and the development and launch of 'Seasonal Calendar User Kits' for three age groups. This includes a promotional campaign to education and cultural sectors and launch exhibitions with partner Newcastle Libraries.

4. Illawarra Aboriginal Corporation, Strengthening The Women Through Culture (\$7,270)

Illawarra Aboriginal Corporation will deliver the program *Strengthening The Women Through Culture,* which will provide the opportunity for practicing artists to share their knowledge with other Aboriginal women in the community. Many women, regardless of being on or off Country will have the chance to learn about Aboriginal women's Culture and will be tailored for a range of generations.

5. Ms Lillardia Briggs-Houston, Ngarru Miimi Couture Collection (\$36,000)

Lillardia Briggs-Houston will create a couture fashion range inspired by her Gangulu-Yorta Yorta-Wiradjuri cultural heritage and expressed through original designs in printing, painting, and adornment.

6. Mrs Jodie Choolburra, Brolga Dance Academy (\$60,000)

Brolga Dance Academy provides a space for Aboriginal storytelling through dance. The Academy will deliver eight one-day workshops in the greater Sydney region and regional NSW. The workshops will be available to Indigenous people and there will be weekly dance classes in Aboriginal contemporary and traditional dance for 5 to 18 years and for older people.

7. Ms Johanna Clancy, Yindyang Bila (\$12,000)

Johanna Clancy will present *Yindyang Bila*, meaning slow river in Wiradjuri language, which will pay homage through song and dance to Wiradjuri Matriarchs and their connection to the waterways. Can you see the women in the water? Can you hear them whispering? From the sacredness of our wombs, we are the keepers of the water.

8. Indigenise Pty Limited, Story of Country, Land, Sea and Air (\$40,000)

Indigenise will commission six artworks that tell the story of Country for Sydney Olympic Park. Aboriginal-led artists and community will produce works for display at active transport gateways at Olympic Park Station and a Ferry Terminal as well as a multimedia interpretation of the Wangal Walk.

9. Ms Barbara McGrady, Indigenous Sporting Heroes (\$38,000)

Indigenous media-accredited photojournalist/sports photographer, Barbara McGrady will exhibit large-scale photographs of Indigenous sporting heroes on sports court walls behind Broadway on Gadigal land; to present strong positive role models for young Indigenous youth and broader community to inspire them to realise their ambitions.

10. Mr Kauri Munro-Greentree, Full Circle, Gamilaraay artist, Kauri debut album (\$53,519)

Recording and launching the debut album of Gamilaraay singer/songwriter Kauri. Kauri will be mentored by Julian Belbachir, to realise the inclusion of strings, drums, lapsteel and didgeridoo across the album. This project supports professional artists mentoring emerging artists, a PR campaign, the creation of assets and an album launch event.

11. Mr Troy Russell, The Last Shot (\$40,000)

The Last Shot is a story of anger and sorrow, told through conceptual composition with a folk twist. It is a story that tells of the love and happiness found in each other's arms and hearts that ends tragically for many people whose lives have been lost in colonial Australia.

12. Dr Regina Saunders, #burra-bee-dee (flying mice) (\$19,800)

#burra-bee-dee is an experimental animation project, which takes its starting point from a traditional Gamilaraay survival story. The Project will poetically explore how young Indigenous people can learn to trust in and understand the long-term value of sustaining a strong connection to country, culture, and community.

13. Miss Brittanie Shipway, Yellow Rock - A Gumbaynggirr Songline (\$17,500)

Yellow Rock: A Gumbaynggirr Songline is a new musical that is in development which merges traditional Gumbaynggirr language, song and dreaming stories with modern storytelling. The music, book and lyrics will be written by Gumbaynggirr storyteller Brittanie Shipway.

14. Ms Leanne Tobin, Ngalawan – We Live We Remain (\$35,000)

Focussing on Dharug resilience, Leanne Tobin will use the unique lifecycle and migratory journey of the Eel, an important Dharug creation story, to present a major new contemporary installation and participatory work for the 23rd Biennale of Sydney (2022) at Information + Cultural Exchange, Parramatta and The Cutaway, Barangaroo.

15. Tweed Byron Local Aboriginal Land Council, The Orphan Rocks Cultural Landscapes Heritage Recording (\$30,000)

The Northern Rivers region of NSW has a recurring series of landscape alignments; near-shore islands, headlands, and mountains, which are the subject of Bundjalung creation stories and songlines. The Orphan Rocks Cultural Landscapes Heritage Project is designed to record these alignments and the authentic cultural records; songs and dialogue in Bundjalung language.

16. Worimi Local Aboriginal Land Council, Telling the Worimi Story (\$40,000)

Telling the Worimi Story will see stories from Worimi Elders and community members captured to create an enduring archive of unique experience and perspectives. As the local Elders age recording the stories becomes increasingly important. Their stories will create the fabric of the Murrock Culture Centre, yielding an enduring archive of unique experience and perspectives.

17. Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service Ltd, Walgett Freedom Ride Mural (\$60,000)

Walgett Freedom Ride Mural will involve the development of a mural depicting the history of the 'Freedom Riders' who travelled through Walgett in 1965. It will focus on Walgett's association with the Freedom Ride, identifying significant local Aboriginal people who had a key lead in the demonstrations and events specific to the town.

Organisation Program and Projects (4) \$425,000

1. Armidale and Region Aboriginal Cultural Centre and Keeping Place Inc (ACCKP), 2021/22 Arts and Cultural Organisations Funding (\$60,000)

Armidale and Region Aboriginal Cultural Centre and Keeping Place (ACCKP) will deliver a program encompassing 20 newly curated exhibitions and dance programs, Aboriginal Men's gatherings, Aboriginal Women's gatherings, Elders' group, Photography Club and ACCKP Friends meetings, workshops, tours, and holiday Programs.

2. Burrundi Theatre for Performing Arts Ltd, Burrundi Theatre for Performing Arts 2021-22 Program (\$135,000)

Burrundi Theatre for Performing Arts will deliver a comprehensive twelve-month performing arts program that supports the wellbeing and career pathways of First Nations artists both in regional and metropolitan areas.

3. Boomalli Aboriginal Artists Co-operative Ltd, 2022 Arts and Cultural Organisations Funding - Boomalli (\$130,000)

Boomalli Aboriginal Artists Co-operative will deliver its 2022 artistic program including its Annual Mardi Gras exhibition, Members exhibition celebrating 35 years, a collaboration with Umbarra Cultural Centre, a Women's exhibition titled *This Is Us* and four online and satellite exhibitions.

4. Saltwater Freshwater Arts Alliance Aboriginal Corporation, Saltwater Freshwater (SWFW) 2022 Annual Program Funding (\$100,000)

The 2022 SWFW annual program will deliver arts and culture projects to Gumbaynggirr, Dunghutti, Biripi and Worimi nations. Projects include various culture camps, weaving workshops, Made Deadly Music, and an Annual Festival, promoting skills development, maintenance, and preservation of traditional practices, enabling intergenerational knowledge transfer from Elders to our youth.

1. Bar Whispers Pty Ltd, Hustle & Flow Present: ALWAYS (\$30,000)

Bar Whispers will develop an accessible live music program engaging professional contemporary Australian First Nations artists to present live performances of cultural significance to the community.

Organisations Program and Projects (12): \$787,000

1. The Australian Haydn Ensemble Inc, Australian Haydn Ensemble 2022: A New Decade Begins (\$100,000)

A New Decade Begins is a celebration of a new decade for the Australian Haydn Ensemble with presentations across the country. All performances will highlight artistic excellence and audience engagement, being the hallmarks of Haydn Ensemble's first 10 years, this is an exciting future. Over 50% of the 50 performances will be outside Sydney CBD.

2. Australian Romantic & Classical Orchestra, 2022 Concert Season, Regional Touring, Education Programs and Digital Expansion (\$125,000)

In 2022, the Australian Romantic & Classical Orchestra will further develop its annual subscription series and education programs in Sydney, Western Sydney, and Newcastle, and will expand its regional NSW and interstate touring. Its national youth orchestra camp will be in Western Sydney and the organisation's digital footprint will increase.

3. Australian Vocal Ensemble Incorporated, 2022 Australian Vocal Ensemble (AVÉ) NSW commissioning and development project (\$60,000)

The Australian Vocal Ensemble will commission six NSW composers to write new works for the ensemble and complete a development period. The project will engage two First Nations composers and established and emerging composers from NSW. The works will form a program to later tour NSW regionally.

4. Bach Akademie Australia Ltd, Bach Akademie Australia 2022 organisation funding (\$50,000)

The Bach Akademie Australia 2022 yearly program is built around four core concert series. The program includes Sydney, Western Sydney, and regional concerts, builds audience reach, builds education and digital components and as organisational sustainability, retaining core commitment to world-class excellence, innovation, and contemporary relevance of Bach.

5. The House That Dan Built Inc, The House 2022 Program of New Works, and Regional Tours (\$95,000)

Through a process of cross-generational collaboration and mentorship, The House That Dan Built will create new choral and contemporary opera works led by women at the forefront of Australian music practice. public schools, insightful workshops, and a professional standard concert series for the wider community.

12. Sydney Chamber Choir Incorporated, Sydney Chamber Choir 2022 Season (\$52,000)

Sydney Chamber Choir's season will deliver the finest choral music to audiences across New South Wales, including new works by Kate Reid, Brooke Shelley and Ella Macens as well as a Goulbourn performance and studio recording of Paul Stanhope's Requiem.

1. Australian World Orchestra Limited, Australian World Orchestra present their 2022 concerts and education program/project (\$30,000)

2. E Jigalin & LG Nightingale t/as BackStage Music, BackStage Music Festival 2022 Living Music in a Living Space (\$26,300)

Backstage Music is an artist-run concert platform that nurtures the grassroots of creative art music in Australia. It provides a living space to encourage and enable the collaboration of musicians of diverse backgrounds, career stages and interests, in a sonic melting pot of the new.

3. Mr Roger Benedict, When George met Arnold (\$16,500)

Roger Benedict will develop and present a multimedia performance celebrating the unlikely friendship between two iconic early 20th century composers, George Gershwin, and Arnold Schoenberg.

4. Dr Benjamin Carey, La Machine Ouverte (\$8,000)

La Machine Ouverte is an electroacoustic work for ELISION ensemble, scored for saxophone, cello, trombone, percussion, and live electronic sound. Musically and formally, the work explores Simondon's concept of the 'open machine' as a metaphor for musical interactivity, and encounters between human and non-human agencies in performance.

5. Dr Aristea Mellos, Sydney Bach Society's Caccini Circle (\$26,700)

7. A/Prof Paul Stanhope, New Chamber Opera Development (\$30,972)

Composer Paul Stanhope to work with librettist Wendy Beckett to undertake creative development phase on a new Chamber Opera, collaborating with Sydney Chamber Opera in

a workshop to develop a substantial section of the new work at Carriageworks in August 2022.

1. Electronic Music Conference Pty Ltd, EMC Next Generation Scholarship (\$29,800)

A six-month, intensive professional development scholarship, providing professional development to three emerging NSW artists. Weekly one-on-one sessions will be provided by industry experts in the following areas: Music making, management, marketing, PR and promotion, Live performance development, and DIY music releases.

2. Free Broadcast Inc, FBi Radio Dance Class (\$35,000)

Dance Class is FBi Radio's comprehensive DJ training and mentoring initiative supporting the next generation of women, non-binary and trans talent in dance music.

3. Future Classic Holdings Pty Ltd, Future Classic Redfern Studio (\$25,000)

Facilitating and running a writing, recording, and streaming space from a shopfront in Redfern, NSW below the Future Classic office. Partnering with other local management companies and music organisations, the space will run programs for artists and independent managers and be utilised for artist various projects.

4. Information and Cultural Exchange Inc, I.C.E. will produce and present *Picture Of Everything* (\$58,998)

Picture of Everything is a music development, recording and distribution project for eleven emerging artists, participants in the Club Weld program for marginalised, neurodiverse, and intellectually disabled musicians.

5. JAM Orange Inc, Orange Winter Jazz Festival 10-12, 2022 (\$48,000)

The inaugural Orange Winter Jazz Festival in 2022 will showcase NSW's premier jazz musicians alongside musicians from the NSW Central West, providing high-quality music performances for regional audiences and employment for professional NSW-based artists.

 Taylor Beadle-Williams will deliver a high impact tour of gigs through regional NSW to restart and stimulate the live music scene in NSW beyond Sydney and to create a strong regional fan base.

2. The Bowerbird Collective Ltd, *Re:Naming Australia* - Creative Development Residency (\$25,000)

Phase One of new work exploring Australian identity through the lost names of flora, fauna, places and spaces, featuring Jazz saxophonist Zac Hurren, Aboriginal neo-classical artist Eric Avery, sound designer Mark Coles Smith, multimedia storytellers Simone Slattery and Anthony Albrecht (The Bowerbird Collective) and singer-songwriter Katie Noonan.

3. Ms Amanda Brown, Amanda Brown Solo Album - Visual Post-Production & Promotion (\$10,919)

This project will see Amanda Brown develop a multi-layered visual package and marketing launchpad for her debut solo album.

4. Dr Yantra de Vilder, *Pianos for the People* (\$19,000)

Pianos for the People reactivates public spaces, in these unprecedented times, by providing upcycled pianos and community concerts, free for the public to enjoy and to participate in creating music in public spaces.

5. Ms Amanda Dumesny, Using Contemporary Music to Rise in Rural and Remote NSW (\$16,000)

Bringing modern band opportunities to young people in rural and remote regional NSW to give them music learning, composing, performing, and recording opportunities they otherwise wouldn't have. This will culminate in a unique original performance at the Ewingar Rising concert in outback NSW to celebrate resilience from bushfires and drought.

6. Miss Nardine Gharsa, Wave 2 EP & Frequency Studios (\$14,599)

Nardine Gharsa will create a second Frequency EP and establish Frequency Studios - a community music space that supports emerging artists. Frequency started as a live jam, focussing on amplifying marginalised voices. The success of this initiative resulted in a collaborative EP due for release.

7. Miss Chirine Jaafar, Hell or High Water EP (\$17,500)

This project will be Chirine Jaafar's first body of work in the form of an EP. Jaafar will collaborate with a visual team, DP, photographers, editors, stylist, MUA, and musicians, mastering engineers, and a PR agency.

8. Mr Francisco Lara Puerto, *The Andalusian Guitar* - Regional NSW and National Tour (\$19,990)

Acclaimed guitarist Francisco Lara Puerto (Paco Lara) will take his recently released album, *The Andalusian Guitar*, on a regional NSW and national tour. The project's repertoire of flamenco and original compositions will educate and inspire Australian audiences on contemporary Spanish Flamenco performance.

9. Mr Jeffrey Liu, JËVA & Friends Presents: Typhoon EP Launch (\$2,781)

Four years in the making, *Typhoon* EP symbolises the journey that JËVA went through to become who he is today. *Typhoon* EP tells the story of the loss of a friend, heartbreak and a coming out moment. The Launch will be JËVA's debut headline show.

10. Mr Jack McAllister, Record, mix and release the debut album by Willaris. K (\$34,000)

In conjunction with Australian and international record labels (Soothsayer/Mushroom and Astralwerks/Capitol), Jack McAllister will record, mix, and release his first full length album under his professional name *Willaris*. *K*. The album will be recorded in Australia and the US and involve several high profile local and international collaborators.

11. Miss Caitlin McGregor, Woo Club Mixtape: togetherness through music (\$35,000)

Caitlin McGregor will create a body of work with the help of thirteen other artists remotely to magnify the theme of togetherness. Celebrating connectedness through the essence of dance music, this queer-led, artist-forward project will invigorate audiences in the aftermath of COVID-19.

12. Ms Zela Margossian, Mentoring for Zela Margossian (\$12,420)

Ahead of a significant international recording release, Zela Margossian will undertake business mentoring with three experienced music professionals and will engage an international PR, to help her formulate a three-year business plan designed to develop her

career on all fronts including skills and information upgrade/exchange, international and national networks and increased profile.

13. Ms Jamaica Moana, Jamaica Moana - Debut Album - Bud and Deni (\$19,900)

Having developed a strong underground following, especially within the LGBTIQA+ communities around Australia, Jamaica Moana is gearing up for her debut release - expanding her reach and audience as one of the leading diverse voices emerging from the Western Sydney hip-hop scene, intersecting of Maori, ballroom and hip-hop culture.

14. Mr Cody Munro Moore, Stranded - Heart of the Illawarra (\$11,000)

Stranded - Heart of the Illawarra is a cultural activity involving artists and bands from the Illawarra to perform live at Stranded studios, a premier recording space in Bellambi to a small audience, which will be recorded, mixed and available on demand through participating websites, and social media outlets.

15. Murray and Burgess, Call and Response: searching for birdsong in the *Fallen Forest* (\$26,500)

This project creates original music for *Fallen Forest*, an exhibition at the Blue Mountains Cultural Centre about the plight of the regent honeyeater. Instigated in Western Sydney by artists Murray and Burgessm, it involves a commission by composer Felicity Wilcox and engaging musicians to record and perform the composition.

16. Ms Angela Paez Izquierdo, ANGE will present her bilingual debut EP (\$17,295)

ANGE will showcase her debut EP, aimed to present her experience as a Spanish born woman to an Australian audience, shedding light on people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds. ANGE will collaborate with a female-identifying team including Pasifika choreographer Sela Vai and lighting designer Chloe Stafford to create a multi-arts live launch.

17. Mr John Prest, *Test Tones* - Studio development for an immersive audio-visual performance (\$4,500)

A two-week development held at Golden Retriever Studios, Sydney, to create new works of ambient and experimental music for use in an interdisciplinary performance work titled *Test Tones*. This project continues career development from arts professional and composer to arts leader and interdisciplinary artist.

18. Top Shelf Productions Pty Ltd, Top Shelf Presents: Bobby Singh Collaborations Album (\$59,500)

In partnership with Top Shelf Productions, renowned Australian tabla maestro Bobby Singh will produce his first solo album, collaborating with some of the country's finest musicians and under the guidance of his teacher and guru in India Aneesh Pradhan, recognised as one of the world's finest tabla players.

19. Miss Niamh Watson, ELEGY EP by NEAV (\$19,654)

The *ELEGY* EP project will deliver a collection of five to six original contemporary songs and two associated music videos performed by the artist NEAV (Niamh Watson), which will be accessed via music and video steaming services.

20. Ms Jasmin Williams, Debut Album production - Jazz Williams (\$7,850)

Regional-based independent songwriter and performer, Jasmin Williams, will complete a debut album for release and distribution.

21. The Quokkas, The Quokkas mini-album launch - Can You Do It Song (\$13,500)

The Quokkas (a kids-music band of five members with diverse cultural backgrounds and abilities) will write and record multiple songs for a mini-album, which has a message of acceptance and inclusion. 3. Western Riverina Arts Ltd, Illuminated Projection Art - *Telling Untold Stories through*Art (\$30,000)

Telling Untold Stories through Art is a community collaboration project that will
celebrate and showcase historical Leeton stories, and engage audiences through
bold and innovative light projections and site-specific art to Leeton's Chelmsford
Place. Free to the public, the project will have a clear intention of art
accessibility and bring art into the street.

Individual / Group Projects (3): \$40,350

Bestman Holdings Pty Ltd (XYZ Dimensions), Wave Machine exhibit installation at Science Space, Wollongong (\$18,000)

Wave Machine is a 15-metre-long interactive physics display that demonstrates the
invisible forces that propagate through air and fluids. This hands-on STEAM exhibit is
the largest Wave Machine of this kind in the world. Bestman Holdings Pty Ltd will
provide exhibit a permanent home at the Science Space, Wollongong.

2. S Chandler & R Feneley (Wide On), Biggest Thots in History (\$2,500)

Biggest Thots in History will be a feminist podcast with a satirical edge, re-examining
the representation of history's most controversial women, and the iteration of these
tropes in current-day media portrayals. "Thot" is defined as a perceived social
practice by which a woman is seen to be using their sexuality to "hack" social capital.

3. Johanna Kijas, Unearthing stories from Far North Coast's forests, swamps, and heathlands (\$19,850)

Unearthing Stories will link biography and landscape, exploring early defenders of
forests, swamps, and heathlands. Individuals from unlikely places that made things
happen form the basis of a publication and exhibition. It will acknowledge unheard
stories of foresters, farmers and local mothers who rarely appear in North Coast
environmental histories.

1. Australian Plays Transform, Developing the Dramaturg (\$60,000)

 Developing the Dramaturg is a strategy to diversify the practitioner base in story development. Through a story lab, mentorship, and placement in producing organisations, six dramaturgs identifying as First Nations, culturally and linguistically diverse people, People of Colour will develop skills and career pathways to enable sector capacity building in new work development in theatre.

2. Australian Theatre for Young People, *Past the Shallows* an ATYP and Archipelago (TAS) Coproduction (\$60,000)

 The world premiere of Past the Shallows adapted by Julian Larnach from the iconic teenage novel by Favel Parrett. This professional production would be presented in partnership with Tasmanian company Archipelago Productions and will be built to tour.

3. Critical Stages, Alphabetical Sydney (\$60,000)

 Critical Stages Touring will be premiering a new musical for young audiences, adapted from the popular and acclaimed children's book by Hilary Bell & Antonia Pesenti, and will be built to tour.

4. Curious Legends Limited, Curious Legends Annual Program (\$80,000)

Curious Legends will create work by and for NSW regional communities, working
closely with groups to empower them to learn new skills, connect and share. They
will focus on the core areas of large-scale, site-specific performance, street theatre
and creative development, education and families and artist development.

5. Darlinghurst Theatre Ltd, Darlinghurst Theatre Company (aka Darlo) - 2022 annual program (\$100,000)

 A 2022 season of exceptional, inclusive theatre, cabaret, performances, and music that is radical, innovative, and joyous. Darlo will develop, produce, and present world-class work, develop new Australian works, upskill, and mentor artists and arts workers, tour nationally, evolve our venue and home and embed access, inclusion, and equity into the organisation.

6. Ensemble Limited, Ensemble Theatre producing *A LETTER FOR MOLLY* by Brittanie Shipway (\$60,000)

 A LETTER FOR MOLLY is a new work by emerging Gumbaynggirr playwright Brittanie Shipway, directed by award winning actor and director Ursula Yovich. The play explores how generational experiences echo through time and shape the present, in a celebration of culture, identity and the power of the mother-daughter relationship.

7. Erth Visual and Physical Inc, Final Development: ARC, major new work for children and families (\$60,000)

 The final development phase for ARC, a major new puppetry/physical theatre work for children, premiering at Sydney Opera House and Arts Centre Melbourne in 2022.
 ARC: is a magical world of rare and precious creatures, a show that finds a way to talk to children about fragility, hope, loss, and grief.

8. New Ghosts Theatre Company, Presentation of *Girl Band* at Riverside Theatre (\$45,862)

 New Ghosts Theatre Company will produce a 2-week presentation of Girl Band in association with National Theatre of Parramatta. Their objective is to document and showcase an ambitious, new, artist-led work, develop the Company's capacity as a small arts organisation, and connect with Western Sydney audiences.

9. PACT Centre for Emerging Artists Inc, PACT 2022 Annual Program: Future Generators/Generations (\$100,000)

Supporting emerging artists as the engines that power the arts sector, in 2022 PACT will deliver an integrated program of presentation and development opportunities to identify, support and drive performance culture for the next generation of NSW's artists and audience.

 Theatre Network NSW will produce an annual program of activity designed to connect, empower, and advocate for the NSW theatre and performance community. This program is responsive to the needs of the sector and driven by demand from their members.

14. Shopfront Arts Co-op Ltd, Harness Ensemble Final Development and Presentation 2022 (\$42,000)

Harness Ensemble will present a new work following an extensive professional skills
development program and Long Form Creative Development. Shopfront's premier
ensemble for emerging theatre artists aged 18-26 with and without disability. The
ensemble has worked with 13 NSW leading creatives on the development of their
new professional theatre work.

1. Nick Atkins t/as Operated Coin, The Lemon Tree Curse (\$17,233)

• The Lemon Tree Curse is the development of a new play about siblings, genetic modification and how family folklore shapes the people we become.

2. Hilary Bell, Writing a musical of *Picnic at Hanging Rock* (\$27,500)

• The collaborating team of Hilary Bell (book and lyrics) and Greta Gertler Gold (music) will write a full script and score for a new Australian musical, based on Joan Lindsay's novel *Picnic at Hanging Rock*, including producing three song demos.

3. Mark Bolotin, Performance Box (\$18,770)

 Performance Box will be an innovative new web platform to help artists perform live online, connect with new audiences, and derive an alternate source of income during COVID-19 and beyond. This project is to develop and showcase six innovative prototype performances for the platform.

4. Mary Rachel Brown, Mary Rachel Brown will write a work for the stage (\$15,900)

 Ms Mary Rachel Brown will write a new play entitled *Die Ready*. This comic oneperson play is about Death Doula Desirae Rosenberg, a woman who transformed her life by helping others end theirs. The play will be a dark and witty look at the taboos and rituals that surround end of life.

5. Karen Therese Corbett, Rehearsal, presentation of performance work *Sleeplessness* and participation program (\$25,800)

 Rehearsal and premiere of a two-week season of new theatre work Sleeplessness by Karen Therese at Carriageworks. Part mystery, part documentary, part forensic investigation, Sleeplessness maps a remarkable Australian story told across three generations of women. This project includes rehearsal and presentation of new work, artist residency and participatory program.

6. Margaret Davis, Lookout/Look Out! (\$8,455)

 Lookout/Look Out! is a Stage Two creative development of a theatre project in conjunction with historic sites in the Blue Mountains exploring the integration of visual and oral storytelling using spoken narrative, video, and live landscape painting with both Aboriginal (Darug) and non-Aboriginal artists.

7. Jennifer Ellis, Turn Off the Dark – Exploring Children's Experiences During Lockdown (\$19,960)

Ms Jennifer Ellis will develop a new puppetry performance that explores the
experience of children during COVID-19 lockdowns. The project will be developed in
partnership with Fairfield City Museum & Gallery and draw on the experiences of
children in the area through a series of workshops.

8. fervour. Destroy, She Said Rehearsal Period for Presentation (\$19,999)

 Following two years' development *Destroy, She Said*, a new work loosely inspired by Marguerite Duras' book, will premiere in Belvoir's 25A program in January 2022.
 Funding will provide industry-standard rehearsal payment to 13 artists who have been seriously impacted by COVID-19 and have demonstrated a long-term commitment to the project.

9. Cheryn Frost, Volcanoes & Vulvas; The Exploration Of My Two Greatest Loves (\$18,000)

 Volcanoes & Vulvas is an original experimental theatrical production written by Cheryn Frost. The proposed development, rehearsal and presentation period will involve developing the performative aspects, sound and lighting design and theatrical elements of the production for its mainstage presentation; and collaboratively explore concepts of the queer experience, relationships, survival, and sacrifice.

10. IJ Gardam & SC Lusty-Cavallari t/as Montague Basement, *The Great Australian Play* Development for NSW Production (\$19,999)

 A development for The Great Australian Play by Kim Ho, a new Australian play, to secure an NSW presentation and create paid employment and future opportunities for NSW artists. This will represent a rare and vital opportunity to secure a second life for a new Australian play.

11. Kate Gaul, It's Still Her Voice (\$19,604)

A creative development and workshop showing of It's Still Her Voice, which collides
Francis Poulenc's operatic adaptation of Jean Cocteau's one-act play, La Voix
Humaine, and the play itself. The play explores the heightened effect of a mediated
reality and the need for an audience in the role technology plays in intimate
relationships.

12. Zoe Hollyoak, HORSES by Kunst Productions at Belvoir St Theatre (\$19,999)

 HORSES is a break-neck theatrical adaptation of the 1935 novel They Shoot Horses, Don't They? adapted by Ian Sinclair, directed by Tait de Lorenzo, and produced by Zoë Hollyoak. The project will involve final-stage script development, rehearsals, and premiere season at Belvoir Street Theatre in February 2022.

13. Valley Lipcer, Creative development of *Understory*, a new theatre work for children (\$59,696)

 Understory is an immersive theatre and interactive game experience for young audiences that encourages wonder and curiosity for the natural world. The show will be staged in the Lismore Rainforest Botanic Gardens and developed by a diverse creative team in consultation with scientists, young people, teachers, and Indigenous knowledge holders.

14. Rebecca Massey, 44 SEX ACTS IN ONE WEEK (\$26,792)

Rehearsals and Sydney Festival 2022 presentation of a new Australian work, written
by David Finnigan and produced by Club House Productions. 44 SEX ACTS creates
moments in the dark together where we are encouraged to take in the massive
climate disaster that we are facing in our day to day lives. As well as a hilarious
apocalyptic rom com performed as a live radio play, 44 SEX ACTS is, at its comically
dark heart, a well-timed theatrical response to the global pandemic.

15. Moreblessing Maturure, Milk & Honey & Lemons (\$60,000)

 Rehearsal and presentation of a hybrid immersive performance work set on the backdrop of modern migration that follows a young Black boy's 'coming of age' in a society that's taught to fear who he's becoming. This work will exist as a live performance and audio installation.

16. Scarlet McGlynn, The premiere of A is for Apple by Jessica Bellamy (\$19,999)

A is for Apple is a new Australian play by Jewish playwright Jessica Bellamy that will
premiere in Griffin Theatre's 2022 Lookout Season. This formally inventive comedy
will engage diverse audiences and the Jewish community in live theatre, while
providing award wages for nine NSW-based creatives, designers, and production
staff.

17. Felicity Nicol, Political Animals - Sydney's 1978 Mardi Gras to Marriage Equality (\$40,365)

 Protests, parties, politics and the personal collide whilst mapping the evolution of Australian queer rights and the pivotal role of NSW. Felicity Nicol, with strong community and artistic partnerships, will work with rainbow youth and Senior Citizens, community, and creatives to deliver PA's second creative development driven by LGTBQIA+ leadership.

18. Najee Tannous, Tabouli Stories, by Najee Tannous (\$19,900)

Part sensory, part theatre show, *Tabouli Stories* is Australia's first-ever Middle
 Eastern immersive experience. A new contemporary work of daring and true stories
 of second-generation queer migrants; a participatory show deliciously balanced with
 enough humanity and humour to excite anyone's appetite. This is supported and
 presented by Giant Dwarf developments.

19. The Monologue Project, The Monologue Project (\$4,540)

• In partnership with Kings Cross Theatre, with support from Powerhouse Youth Theatre Fairfield, *The Monologue Project* is a pilot writing program for teenage writers to create a monologue, which will be published as a resource for teenagers to perform for the HSC Drama Individual Performance - bridging the gap between young emerging writers and publication.

Visual Arts Board recipients (22) \$1,014,904

1. Accessible Arts, ArtScreen 2022 (\$60,000)

ArtScreen 2022 is a visual art project which enables arts practitioners with disability
to develop their careers by creating and exhibiting works in the increasingly
prevalent format of video art. The artworks will be exhibited at the Museum of
Contemporary Art and will broadcast online.

2. Australian Design Centre, Good Natured: Design Art Architecture (\$60,000)

 Good Natured features Australian creative practitioners working to design a better future. This exhibition highlights artists, makers, designers, and communicators who use their practice to address climate issues and create good outcomes. Audiences are active participants, inspired and engaged to be part of the solution in designing their environment.

3. Asian Australian Artists Association Inc, *Drawn by stones*, Tour 4A Centre for Contemporary Asian Art (\$60,000)

Drawn by stones (2022) brings together artists who utilise ceramics to interrogate
contested histories, stolen land, Indigenous sovereignty, and national identity.
Exhibiting artists from Australia, Hong Kong and Taiwan will be involved and this
exhibition that will tour to galleries in Mildura, Lane Cove, Wollongong (NSW) and
Alice Springs.

4. Cement Fondu, Cement Fondu 2022 Program (\$120,000)

 Cement Fondu's 2022 Program presents free, multi-disciplinary exhibitions, live events, and public programs to inspire, challenge and connect NSW audiences. It will celebrate the diversity of visual arts and artists, commissioning new artworks and host presentations by local, Australian, and international artists and collectives.

5. Hunar Arts & Academia Ltd, Hunar Symposium Conference and Exhibition 2022 (\$15,000)

Hunar Symposium is a hybrid visual art exhibition and academic conference where
international and local artists, activists and academics come together, both
physically and digitally, to create and reflect on art practices from zones of conflict.

6. Museum and Galleries of NSW Ltd, Adaptable engagement program for Zanny Begg tour (\$45,574)

 Zanny Begg's regional tour of *These Stories Will be Different* will bring together significant works that will provide a platform for communities to reflect on local gentrification, consider diverse feminist perspectives, and engage the Tamil diaspora. This regionally aimed program of in-person and online opportunities for Begg and collaborators aligns with her socially engaged practice.

7. Orana Arts Inc, *ID* (hero) (\$35,000)

Artists Dennis Golding and Tara Stanley, and photographer Alex Wisser, will work
with the community of Wellington to establish the town and its people as the
natural home for Superheroes. Combatting decades of media sensationalism, the
community will emerge as Heroes, complete with individual and community capes.

8. Southern Highlands Gallery at Retford Park Ltd, Ngununggula 2022 Annual Create Program (\$140,000)

 Ngununggula's 2022-23 Creative Program will present an ambitious series of exhibitions featuring new, reimagined and historically significant artworks by over 70 Australian artists. The funding will support the production and delivery of these exhibitions and an extensive education and public program.

9. The Corridor Project Ltd, the *CORRIDOR* project - 2022 Arts and Cultural Organisations Funding (\$80,000)

 The CORRIDOR project program will support regional encounters that aim to collaborate, learn, and explore with artists, scientists, community, and travellers. Multi-artform practice will be delivered as residencies, professional development, cross cultural and First Nation perspectives, events, exhibitions, and public programs produced on Wiradjuri Country.

1. Megan Cope, Kinyingarra Guwinyanba (place of oyster rocks) (in Jandai Language) (\$45,460)

 Kinyingarra Guwinyanba (place of oyster rocks) will be a large-scale land artwork on Quandamooka country in South-East Queensland. The artwork will compose of an extensive series of rock formations and will become a future functioning oyster reef. It will feature in Creolisation at the Institute of Modern Art, Brisbane.

2. Bonita Ely, Bonita Ely's artworks at Venice, 2022 (\$55,000)

Dr Bonita Ely has been invited by The European Cultural Centre to represent
 Australia in its sixth edition of the art event, PERSONAL STRUCTURES, running
 alongside the 2022 Venice Biennale. Here, she will present two projects:
 Menindee Fish Kill and the installation Let Me Take You There: the Great Artesian
 Basin.

3. Julia Gutman, Debut Solo Exhibition and Public Program (\$23,800)

 Julia Gutman will present her debut solo exhibition at Sullivan and Strumpf Gallery and an accompanied free public program co-taught with artist Nadia Hernandez.

4. Otis Burian Hodge, TCS Windows 2022 Exhibition Program (\$20,000)

This project will be the curation and production of the 2022 exhibition program
of TCS Windows. TCS Windows is a public-facing window gallery in Newtown
focusing on exhibiting contemporary photographic works, from local and
Australian emerging photographers. The funding will go towards curation and
presentation of 12 monthly exhibitions.

5. Lara Merrett, By my side walking (\$19,000)

This will be an artist book and the direct result of collaborations and activist
engagement with key community voices in the Manyana Bendalong area on Yuin
Country in regional NSW, where the artist lives and works. The project seeks to
understand how community is written through processes of destruction and
regeneration.

6. Ramesh Mario Nithiyendran, Ramesh Mario Nithiyendran: Monograph (\$31,500)

 The development and presentation of the ceramic artist's first monograph, which will be published by Thames and Hudson.

7. Mel O'Callaghan, All Is Life (\$60,000)

 Mel O'Callaghan will create a new performance as part of the solo exhibition, All Is Life. Commissioned by Carriageworks, the exhibition is planned to be presented in late 2022.

8. Catherine O'Donnell, Fibro Majestic (\$19,800)

 Catherine O'Donnell will create new work for a survey exhibition at Orange and Grafton Regional Galleries. She will build a 75% scale of a fibro house, with each side representing a façade of a house from Green Valley, Grafton, Fairfield, and Orange. She will also produce small gold-leaf maquettes of the houses for the exhibition.

9. Rose Pascoe, Undertake professional development to up-skill in digital design and fabrication (\$19,770)

 Rose Pascoe will up-skill in digital design and fabrication techniques and technologies, including experimental 3D machine knitting, CNC, laser and water jet cutting, technical design, and 3D print, to secure the continuation of her arts practice into the future despite her physical needs increasing due to multiple deteriorating chronic health conditions.

10. Alex Seton, Glassworks Residency and Exhibition at Lock Up (\$30,000)

 Alex Seton will create a new body of work contextualised with the history of The Lock-Up, Newcastle, and produced at Canberra Glassworks using glass, a new medium in his practice. The resulting works will be presented in an ambitious solo exhibition alongside public programming at The Lock-Up, Newcastle.

11. Tim Silver, Bodily Dependencies - the production of two major new artworks (\$50,000)

 The project will develop two major new artworks, each featuring two life sized bodies cast in differing forms of embrace or interaction. The works draws us to appreciate the human necessity of these simple gestures of touch, tenderness, embrace and bodily entanglement.

12. Leo Tanoi, C3West Pasifika (working title) (\$25,000)

 C3West Pasifika is an artist-led project that seeks to engage Pasifika communities in Western Sydney to make positive impacts on community connection and wellbeing.

13. Luke Sciberras, Luke Sciberras, Luke Sciberras – Monograph, (\$58,920)

Luke Sciberras – monograph (working title) will chronicle 25 years of his art
practice and influences. The book is being published to coincide with his first indepth survey exhibition, to be presented at Campbelltown Arts Centre (C-A-C)
and Bathurst Regional Art Gallery (BRAG) in June 2022.
