Wingecarribee REDS fire impact addendum May 2020





Executive summary

This document serves as a fire impact addendum to the Regional Economic Development Strategy (REDS) for Wingecarribee. Its purpose is to identify potential short, medium and long-term focus areas for Local, State and Commonwealth Government to consider when prioritising industry and place based economic recovery funding in response to the 2019-2020 bushfire crisis.

This document was developed in collaboration with regional staff and Local Government Area (LGA) representatives, and utilised input from fire affected engine industry experts. The priorities within this document were identified and are owned by Local Government.

The original REDS for Wingecaribee highlighted a number of industries such as tourism, professional services, manufacturing, aged care and health care, and agriculture as core to the regional economy. The existence of a variety of industries highlights the diversification within the Wingecarribee economy and suggests a degree of resilience to fire crisis. In terms of impact, tourism was the most impacted industry, with significant damage to natural amenity and property, and indirect effects from access issues and public perception. Agriculture and viticulture also experienced direct fire impact through asset, herd and crop loss. These affected industries are expected to recover in the medium term as natural amenity recovers and new production seasons evolve, but support is likely necessary to assist industries over the short term.

Example priorities identified in this document relate to, but are not limited to, infrastructure investment, diversification and professionalisation of the tourism industry, and development of adjacent emerging industries to improve economic resilience.

These materials are based on preliminary data available as of May 2020.



Note to reader: COVID-19 context and considerations

This document has been prepared in response to the 2019-2020 bushfire crisis. It does not factor in the economic impacts from COVID-19, providing only a bushfire economic impact baseline. As a result: this document and any impact estimates within do not take into account any additional economic impacts which arise from COVID-19 and consider only the economic impact of bushfires.

In response to COVID-19 the Commonwealth and NSW Governments have put in place restrictions on business trade and personal movement to combat the spread of disease. It is anticipated that these restrictions will further impact regional economies and engine industries.

- Industries analysed within this document likely to experience additional impact include tourism related industries such as retail, food and beverage and accommodation services.
- Other regional industries not directly affected by fire are also likely to experience impact including, but not limited to, construction and manufacturing.

The timing of short/medium/long-term priorities and initiatives outlined in this addenda have been adjusted for COVID-19 restrictions known as at May 2020. This includes delays to tourism recovery initiatives such as marketing campaigns. As the length and impact from COVID-19 becomes clearer, the timing of some initiatives may need to be adjusted further.

Any measures put in place by the Commonwealth and NSW Government to support businesses and industries in response to bushfire impact should be viewed in the context of broader recovery measures.



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Impact summary

- 1 Fire within Wingecarribee has impacted a number of engine industries
- 2 Approximately 70% tourism downturn in December and January
- Significant impact to viticulture with majority of 2020 harvest lost
- 4 Substantial fencing and infrastructure damage for agriculture and horticulture industry (over 1,000km of boundary fencing destroyed)



Key takeaways

- Ability to deliver REDS strategic priorities not materially affected over the long term
- Moderate impact, however, to certain industries in short term; opportunity to support recovery moving forward
- Importance of implementing original strategic priorities emphasised by bushfires

Fire impacted area within Wingecarribee:



Key physical impacts:

- • Area burnt¹: 707 km² burnt by bushfires (26% of total FER area 2,689km²)
- Property damage²: 354 properties damaged or destroyed
- Tourism³: significant damage to Wombeyan Caves Road and other natural amenity
- Agriculture⁴: 15 livestock reported dead, of which 5 are cattle
- **Viticulture**⁴: Majority of 2020 vintage lost to smoke taint


□Fire affected area

Wingecarribee relatively exposed to impacted focus industries, especially tourism-related industries





Impacted focus industries

- □Tourism: Tourism is broadly a subset of tourism-related industries such as Retail Trade, Food and Beverage Services, Accommodation etc; CERD analysis indicates that tourism contributes \$94M in GVA and ~7% of FTE employment
- Viticulture: 'Wine, Spirits and Tobacco manufacturing' (proxy for wine manufacturing) account for ~\$6M in GVA
- Agriculture and horticulture:
 Agriculture and horticulture-related industries ('Sheep, Grains, Beef and Dairy Cattle' and 'Other Agriculture' (Horticulture) account for ~\$66M in GVA (and ~4% in FTE employment)
